Westside to Waterhouse Trail Connection

We are so close to being done! We have most of the trail work complete and just a hand full of tasks to complete in the right of way. All of the rectangular rapid flashing beacons at the mid-block crossing need to be installed as well as the pedestrian flasher at the MAX platform. The channelization barriers in the sidewalks on both side of the track are currently being fabricated. The sidewalks are open for use, but be mindful when the contractors are on site finishing up. They will put up signs and tape if they need to have you "go around." There will be only minor inconveniences from now on. Thank you for your patience! We anticipate completion in October.

Grant update – Waterhouse Trail: Willow Creek Trail – Bethany Court (Segment 4)

The district is a recipient of \$400,000.00 I ConnectOregon VI grant funds, awarded by the Oregon Department of Transportation in August. The funds, along with \$300,000.00 from Washington County's Major Street Transportation Improvement Program (MSTIP) Opportunity Fund and \$300,000.00 from the district's system development charge fund, will be used to complete Segment 4 of the Waterhouse Trail and NW Bethany Court. Grant funds are anticipated later this year and final engineering and permitting is expected to get underway in early 2017. Construction would occur during the summer of 2018.

Willow Creek Greenway Habitat Enhancement

This fall, staff and contractors will begin removing weeds, adding logs, and eventually planting native plants that will improve water quality, amphibian habitat, and engage youth on the north side of the greenway south of Cornell Road.

Fanno Creek Trail

The repaving of the trail between S. W. 90th and Fanno Creek is now complete and a smooth new trail is ready for fall visitors.

Cooper Mountain Nature Park

Staff conducted a prescribed burn in the prairie areas of Cooper Mountain Nature Park in early October. The burn was designed to improve the health of the prairie and reduce the fire load of the area. Staff cooperated with Tualatin Valley Fire Rescue and other professionals to meet habitat and safety goals.

7:55 **Beaverton Committee For Community Involvement (BCCI) Report**

No member of our NAC was able to attend the BCCI Meeting this last month

8:00 **Sue Bliss, Volunteer with the Tualatin Soil and Conservation District**, spoke to us about the SWCD Levy that will be on the November ballot. Tualatin Soil and Water

Conservation District is asking voters to approve a permanent tax levy to provide services needed to protect the water, soil, and other natural resources in Washington County. After working for several years to study the needs and resources to meet those needs, the District is asking voters to approve a \$0.09 per \$1,000 property tax rate limit. Current and limited funding sources prevent the District from reaching out to all members of the county and is critical, since 80% of Washington County is privately owned. The District provides education, technical assistance, and conservation planning to farmers, woodland owners, businesses, and local residents.

8:20 **Measure 97 Discussion, Discussion Pro and Con**

We had to representatives leading the discussion about their view of the measure. The measure proposes an increase on the corporate minimum tax for corporations making more than \$25 million in Oregon sales; funds education, healthcare, and senior services.
