THPRD Report presented by Julia Rocha, Center Supervisor Athletic center

Whispering Woods Park Bridge: Winter weather delayed the original start time for replacement of the deck boards, railings and stringers; the new project time line will be between March 1 – 14th.

Natural Resources: the number of NR volunteers doing short-term projects during the 2015-16 fiscal year soared 73% over the 2014-15 numbers, to nearly 3,000. That followed a 23% increase in the previous fiscal year. (Those numbers are for short-term volunteers only. THPRD also has hundreds of volunteers who participate in longer-term projects each year.) Other outreach efforts Natural Resources has initiated in recent years:

- Expanded its service learning program to include Ridgewood Elementary School and Five Oaks Middle School. Natural Resources also works with the Beaverton School District's Health & Science School and is partnering with Dig In, a local nonprofit organization, to assist middle school students at Rachel Carson School of Environmental Science.
- Became more strategic on where to schedule daylong volunteer opportunities, usually with dedicated community partners who help the district advocate and recruit for volunteers.
- Added part-time staff members to assist with project management and volunteer program support, freeing up Melissa Marcum, the coordinator, to focus on higher priorities, including greater responsiveness to the public.

GFOA : The Tualatin Hills Park & Recreation District has been honored for the quality of its budgeting process for the 13th consecutive year. THPRD once again received the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award from the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA). The award reflects a commitment to meet the highest principles for budget transparency and communication with the public.

The Metro Council: has approved a \$3.7 million federal grant to the Tualatin Hills Park & Recreation District for construction of a new, 1.5-mile trail near downtown Beaverton that will offer a variety of benefits to users. The Beaverton Creek Trail will run east-west and connect Hocken Avenue in Beaverton to the Westside Regional Trail at the Tualatin Hills Nature Park. The pathway will be 12 feet wide, which is typical for a regional trail segment. Funding will be awarded in 2019. The park district anticipates starting construction in 2020 and finishing by the end of 2021.

The Spring native plant sale will be April 29th from 10 to 2 at the Nature Center. This summer THPRD will be putting on a **triathlon for kids with disabilities**. It will be the second such event in the country. There is another one in Pennsylvania.

Beaverton Committee for Community Involvement (BCCI) Report –

Richard Pickett will be resuming this position going forward. There is no report this evening.

Presentation on the WILLAMETTE WATER SUPPLY Project

David Marciniak, Public & Business Outreach Specialist, gave us an outline of the new project to bring a new water source online to the city of Beaverton, as well as other local communities.

Some of the information he shared is as follows:

The population of Beaverton, Hillsboro and Washington County is surging. New construction and road projects seems to be on every major arterial. Is our infrastructure keeping up?

It was about 4 years ago when the local water districts realized they needed to begin to deal with the planning for an increased water supply to meet increased population demands.

The Project is a partnership between Tualatin Valley Water District (60%) and the City of Hillsboro (40%)

The partnership hopes to have the system up and running by 2026.

The management of the future water was problematic because it was limited and the partners did not have any ownership, and needed to develop their own water supply for the long term. The middle Willamette water is the most cost effective choice. Ownership and reliability were key components of the decision. Regional benefits also factored in.

Water conservation is a priority – water usage has been cut 15 to 20 percent from a decade ago, but demand is going up, more jobs are coming to the area.

Resiliency and preparedness are very important.

TVWD is the main lead agency for how the project works.

Chair David Kamin adjourned the meeting at 9:00 p.m.
