Welcome and Introductions

The meeting was called to order by David Kamin, Chair, at 7:00

Approval of the June minutes, Additions to Agenda, Treasury Report

The minutes were approved as submitted.

The Treasury report was postponed until next meeting. There have been no changes since last month.

Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue (TVF&R) Report. Five members attended.

Fire Safety is extremely important right now. One of the members, Alan, distributed MEDICAL EMERGENCY CARDS for placement in a home that has a resident who has trouble communicating. The card is a bright pink in color, and is designed to be posted on a refrigerator or bulletin board in a central place in the home. Includes name, medical history, medications, etc. The TVF&R also presented a brochure about the services and events coming up in their organization. They now have a partnership with North Plains, and with Newberg, and with a Phillips cardiac monitoring equipment company. These cardiac monitors will be available on the official TVF&R vehicles and even personal vehicles of the employees so that they can be responsive to emergencies even when they are off-duty.

Our environment is very very dry, so the fire danger is still very much with us. A bark dust fire can smolder for days.

TVF&R participated in the Eagle Creek Fire, and the last group was just de-mobilized. Their personnel volunteer to be mobilized.

Beaverton Police Report

Steve Anderson with Beaverton Police Department is our new liaison, and he was accompanied by Officer Mundell, a new officer who has just completed his training.

THPRD Report presented by Julie Rocha, Center Supervisor Athletic center

Aquatic Center Phase II Renovation Project: The Aquatic Center (50 Meter Pool at 158th and Walker Road) is closed for phase 2 of the facility renovation from August 21 through December 10th. The major projects to be completed include resurfacing of the pool tank, replacement of the pool area deck, redesign of the west side berm in the pool area, paint pool area and resurface dressing room floors. Raleigh Swim Center will be open on a limited basis throughout the duration of the closure.

New Seasons Bag it Forward: The Tualatin Hills Nature Center was chosen by the staff at the Cedar Hills New Seasons Market as a recipient of their bag it forward donation program from now through end of January. People who bring their own bag can vote to donate their bag credit toward educational program scholarships at the nature center.

Asphalt pathway repair projects: Paving and repair of asphalt pathways are being scheduled for later this summer & into the fall. The sites include Beaverton Creek Wetlands, Fanno Creek Trail, Pioneer Park, Sunset Park, and Waterhouse Linear Park.

HMT Schlottman House: The cedar shake roof will be replaced with a luxury shingle created to replicate the look of cedar shakes with the performance of fiber glass construction. The roof is tentatively scheduled to be replaced in early September.

Mountain View Champions Park: Construction is near complete and the general contractor is focusing on the paving and landscape. Construction remains on schedule and we anticipate a soft opening in early September. The grand opening is scheduled for October 14th.

Farmington Road project complete. The city celebrated the completion of the Farmington road project with a ribbon cutting held August 29th. Work is complete after two years of construction activities. The project, a joint effort with Washington County, included street widening and realignments, upgrades to water and sanitary sewer lines, and the installation of bicycle lanes, sidewalks and street lighting.

Housing grant received. The city received a Metro Equitable Housing Grant to build a toolkit to preserve existing affordable housing in Beaverton that may be at risk of becoming unaffordable due to ownership change or rising rents. City staff and a consultant team will spend the next year inventorying Beaverton's multifamily housing stock, examining best practices and recommending potential programs to the City Council that could help preserve housing units.

Beaverton Committee for Community Involvement (BCCI) Report. Richard Pickett

The Beaverton City Council in July 2017 approved plans for collecting food scraps along with yard debris. The program is to begin in October and recycling pails will be distributed for each household starting in late-September 2017. The combined yard debris and food scraps will be converted into compost through a 60 day process. Eventually Beaverton residents will receive a coupon for 1 cubic yard of free compost on an annual basis.

The average Beaverton resident produces about 225 pounds of food waste a year and when combined with yard debris and processed the result becomes a nutrient rich fertilizer. Each week the collection pail should be washed in the dishwasher and the rolling yard debris container should be rinsed out. The rinse water should then be poured on the grass.

#14 Gallons Challenge, Shelley Searle – Support Specialist

This OPB program encourages everyone to store 14 gallons of water for each person in their household. According to the Red Cross each household should have 1 gallon of water per person per day for two weeks to survive an emergency. The water should be stored in a food-grade water storage container. If a person stores tap water it must be properly treated and changed out every six months. Experts recommend purchasing water from a local supermarket for safety reasons.

Community Partners for Affordable Housing (CPAH) presented by Shannon Wilson

CPAH has a new project in pre-development. This group builds affordable rental housing and provides supportive services to its residents in Washington County. Their latest project is located at the SE corner of the intersection of Cornell Rd and Murray Blvd in Cedar Mill.

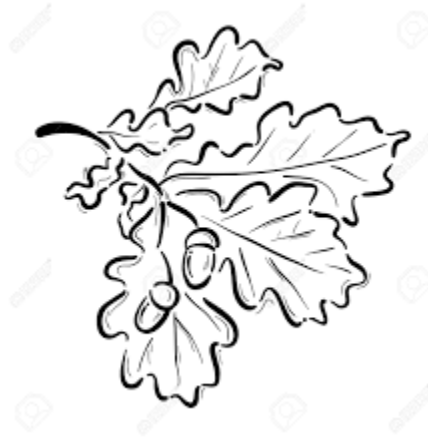
They currently own 8 properties with 374 units. Residents can earn 60 % of that area median income but in fact most of the residents are more like 30%. Many services are provided including a community common area to share.

The new facility will be a 45 unit building, with shared community space. There will be a mix of units, from studio apartments to 3 bedroom units.
