Last month was our highest DUI arrest month – 39 for this department. 11 more than September of 2017. 241 crashes in September – which seems like quite a few, as well.

Attend Beaverton Voters' Forum. The fall Voters' Forum will be held Thursday, Oct. 18 in the Beaverton High School auditorium. The reception begins at 6:15 p.m. and the forum starts at 7 p.m. Featured races include Washington County Chair, State Representative 27, 28, and 34th Districts, and Metro Housing Bond Measure 26-199. Family Resource Fair is Saturday, Oct. 20 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at Beaverton City Library. The goal of the Family Resource Fair is to connect nonprofit groups with families (with children ages 10 and under) they serve in Washington County. Last year, we welcomed nearly 30 nonprofit groups offering free and low-cost services, including health screenings; education assistance; recreation, safety, food and housing resources; and literacy services. The event is fun for families, with giveaways, a free raffle of prizes donated by local businesses, a free book for children who attend the fair, and free vision screenings for children. Volunteers needed for Family Promise of Beaverton. The city is hosting families experiencing homelessness at the Beaverton Community Center Oct. 14-21 and volunteers are needed! The city is one of 12 host sites for Family Promise, a local nonprofit that opened earlier this year and provides transitional housing for families with children. Learn more and sign-up by contacting the city's Community Services program at 503-350-4083. In addition, volunteers are needed for Beaverton's Severe Weather Shelter, which provides a warm, safe space for adults experiencing homelessness to stay during the winter. It is open Thursday nights from November through March at the Beaverton Community Center. A volunteer training will be held Thursday, Oct. 25 from 5 to 8 p.m. for new volunteers, and from 6 to 8 p.m. for returning volunteers. Learn more at www.BeavertonOregon.gov/shelter.

Intersection Speed Enforcement. Speeders beware! Intersection speed enforcement has begun at several city intersections where cameras are already in place to catch red-light violators. These locations include SW Cedar Hills Blvd and Walker Road, SW Beaverton-Hillsdale Hwy and Griffith Drive, SW Allen Blvd and Lombard Ave, and SW Scholls Ferry Road and Hall Blvd. A warning period is currently underway at all four intersections. Tickets will begin being issued mid-October at the Cedar Hills and Walker intersection, and be phased in at the other locations. The cameras will be used to detect drivers going 11 mph or faster over the speed limit with the goal of increasing safety at these locations.

Leaf drop-off dates are set for 2018. Leaf disposal is a free service that is available most Saturdays and Sundays from Oct. 27 through Nov. 25. All drop-off times are 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Leaves may be bagged (paper recommended, but plastic also accepted) or unbagged, and will be happening in coordination with food collecting for Sunshine Pantry. Beaverton Committee for Community Involvement (BCCI) Report, Richard Pickett

Raziah Roushan – Chair of the Beaverton Arts Commission

As a city Beaverton is committed to supporting our emerging artists. There are currently 15 seats available for their Beaverton Arts Commission Board. If you know of someone who is an artist, or who wants to help artists, please encourage them to apply.

The Arts Commission Board currently has a number of programs, some that are continuing, as well as new ones. One of them is a search for locations in all our neighborhoods that we could put murals in. The community has been saying that they want more public works and public art.

Go to City of Beaverton website and look at the departments – the Arts program is the top one. The arts program helps curate 11 art venues around the community. Art on display moves from one location to another. They also provide a lot of artists resources – such as how to photograph your work, how to apply for grants, etc. Marketing for artists.

The Arts Program has an annual budget. They also have an e-newsletter that goes out. This includes things that are going on not just in Beaverton but also in Washington County. Such as the Beaverton Civic Theatre, which is held in the Library. Sign up on the Beaverton City website under the Arts Commission.

Feel welcomed to drop in and visit any meeting. The agenda, time and date are posted online, and they love to welcome community members.

Chris Ayzoukian General Manager, Patricia Reser Center for the Arts

The proposed Patricia Reser Center for the Arts Center integrates into the larger Beaverton Vision Plan.

Some of the features of the center are/will be:

48,000 sf multidisciplinary of multidisciplinary space

550 seat theatre (first floor 250, the rest upstairs)

Dressing rooms

Creative studios

Rehearsal and workshop space in the “Garage”

Art gallery, café, office space for staff, box office

Conference rooms

The architecture is to create a feeling of closeness, intimacy, rather than the older more formal style, such as like the Kennedy Center, etc.

The intention is to not a fortress on the hill, but an accessible friendly theatre.

The parking garage will park 350 vehicles.

Ground floor will be retail – the idea is that people can go, have dinner, see a show,

They design does not include an orchestra pit – it is a downstage multiple use space.

Intention for what will be ‘preformed’ includes music, dance, live theatre, film, festivals, magic, lecture series.

The goal to get to 250 booked nights a year, and to attract visitors to our community to not only come, but to come back. And to encourage new artists, to engage and educate the community. The Center is intended to be welcoming to people of all socio-economic levels.

This is a \$46 million-dollar project in total. The remaining funds needed are 9.5 million. A portion of the costs will be provided by the recently enacted lodging tax. No property tax funds will be used. The Beaverton Arts Foundation is currently managing this project, and they are presently working on the major donor portion of this campaign.

Timeline: The project will break ground when the funds are lined up. Hopefully they will break ground in mid to late 2019, and open in 2021. Construction funds will come from transit lodging tax and private donations, not property tax. Operations will come from earned revenue, transit lodging tax, and no property tax.
